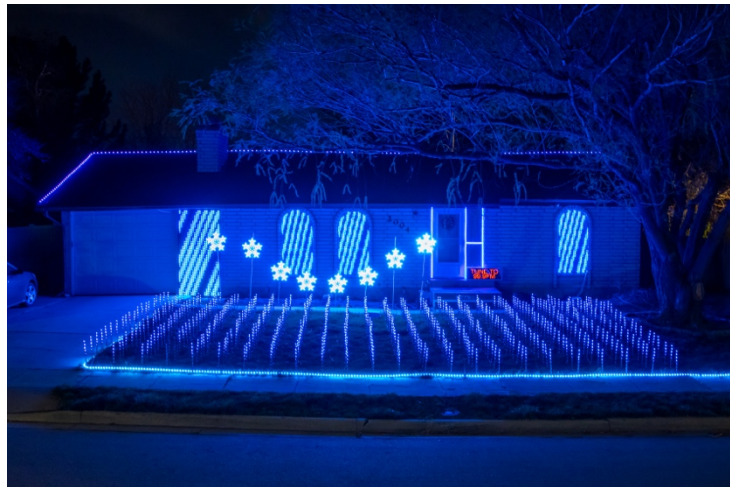


West Jordan Family Shines Light in a Time of Uncertainty

If you live near the Nash family, you know they go ALL out on Christmas lights. Now, four months later, their light display is back up and shining bright.

“We saw an article going around Facebook, saying that people were putting their Christmas lights back up,” said homeowner Bree Nash.

As the Coronavirus pandemic continues, thousands of people across the United States are following suit, digging out their Christmas lights in hopes of sharing joy and inspiration in their communities.



“Usually, Christmas has a positive connotation of love for humanity,” said Nash. “So, I said why don’t we do something like that?”

But unlike others who are stringing lights along their garage or shrubs, the Nash family has an intricate light system that isn’t as easy as just plugging them in.



“All of our lights are very computerized, it takes a little bit of time to get everything set up,” said Jorden Nash. “Every lightbulb has a computer in it, that means I can turn any bulb any color at any time.”

During the holiday season the Nash family encourages others to visit and tune in to a radio station, synchronized to their lights. Now, in the early spring season – the family is once again encouraging others to drive by and take in the spectacle.

“It’s just kind of a fun activity that can get you out of the mundanity of staying in the house,” said Nash. “You can come and stay safe in your car; you don’t even have to roll down the windows. Just tune into the radio station and be entertained and inspired.”



And it's working, people have been driving by and cheering on the Nash family from their cars, others have been giving kudos online, and one man even shared his gratitude with the family in person.

"We did have one older gentleman come and knock on the door midday and say: 'This has just been the best thing that's happened to me, it's really lit up my life'" said Nash.

That man then told the family he was fighting cancer and undergoing chemotherapy.

"He said there isn't much he can do, so he comes to our light shows often," said Bree Nash. "It brings him joy and that was a really special moment for us."

"It's our small way to give back to the community and to give people hope," Jorden Nash added.
